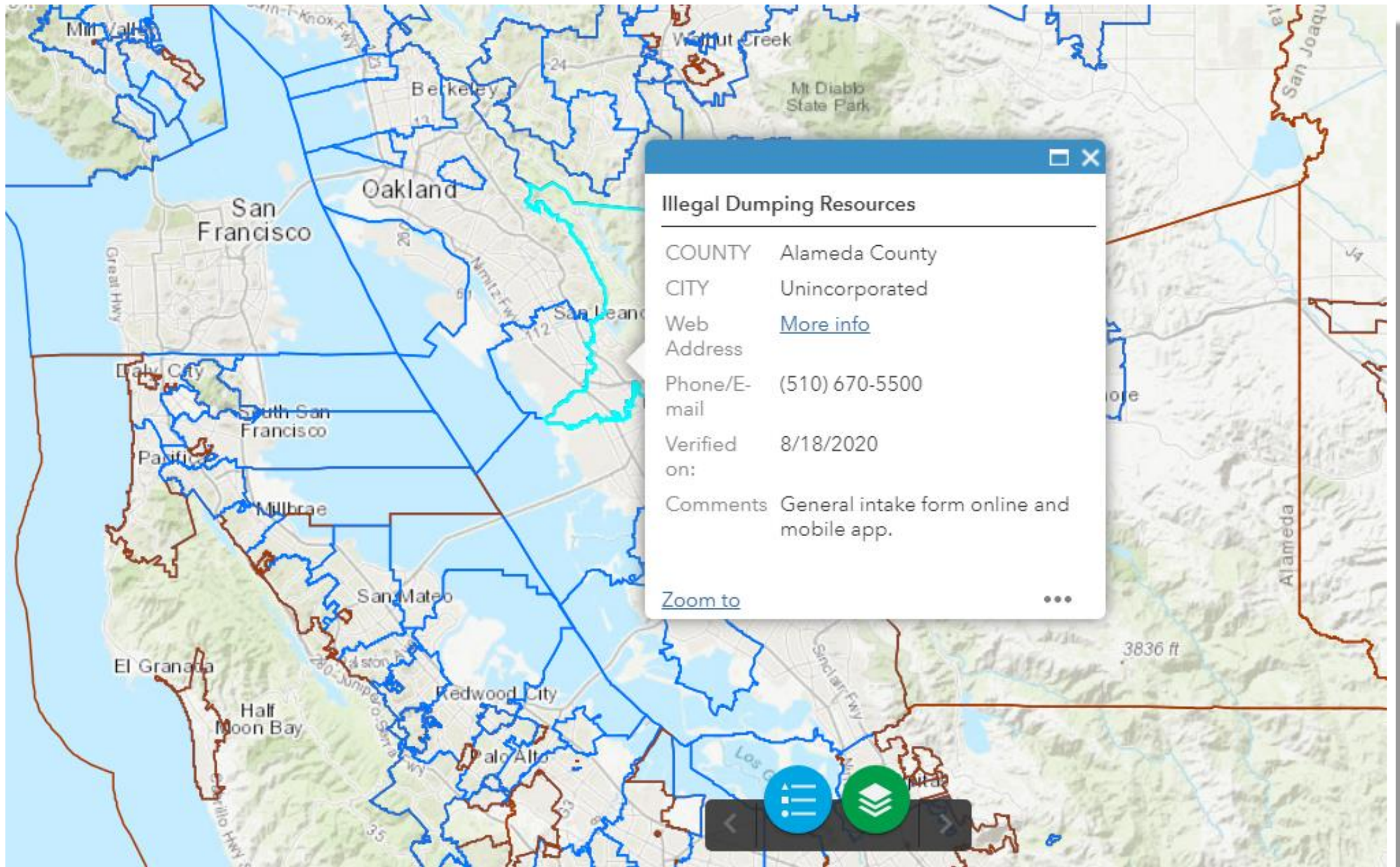

# Keys to Eradication

## Prevention

Illegal dumping of materials such as large appliances, furniture, and refuse is a problem in many California communities. Based on the experiences of many communities, prevention of illegal dumping before it happens in the first place and recurrence if it does is the best strategy to combat illegal dumping.

By making legal disposal of materials convenient and illegal disposal options less attractive, the need for preventing illegal disposal are reduced. This page describes a variety of strategies to prevent illegal dumping.

## Abatement

Abatement means compelling the timely cleanup of illegal dumping on property owners where material is dumped. Abatement is most effective when the person responsible can be identified. When local government can identify the person responsible for illegal dumping, they hold them responsible for the costs (including cleanup and recovery) associated with the cleanup of the property. Timely abatement is key to eradicating illegal dumping and don't invite trashing. Timely abatement is key to eradicating illegal dumping, particularly for hot spots.

## Cleanup

Cleanup, in contrast to abatement, is for properties where the person responsible cannot be identified or is unwilling/unable to pay for cleanup. Cleanup is necessary to protect public health and safety and/or the environment. Cleanup onsite attracts additional illegal dumping--particularly in hot spots.
